Under ODE's *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance, each school¹ has been directed to submit a plan to the district² in order to provide on-site and/or hybrid instruction. 1. Public Health Protocols

1a. COMMUNICABLE DISEASE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR COVID-19

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Conduct a risk assessment as required by OSHA administrative rule OAR 437-001-0744(3)(g).
 - OSHA has developed a <u>risk assessment template</u>.
- Implement measures to limit the spread of COVID-19 within the school setting, including when the school setting is outside a building.

The safety officer is principal Kim Cornette who is responsible to establish, implement, support and enforce al RSSL health and safety protocols and guidance from OHA. All staff are readily able to contact the safety officer to voice concerns or needs.

A Google Form has been created that allows sharing of concerns as they arise. The link is shared in the school newsletter, via email. Parents are also encouraged to contact the Safety Officer directly if anonymity is not desired.

- policies and plans. Review relevant local, state, and national evidence to inform plan.
- Process and procedures established to train all staff in sections 1 -3 of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance. Consider conducting the training virtually, or, if in-person, ensure physical distancing is maintained to the maximum extent possible.
- Protocol to notify the local public health authority (<u>LPHA Directory</u> <u>by County</u>) of any confirmed COVID-19 cases among students or staff.

 - If a student(s) is part of a stable cohort (a group of students that are consistently in contact with each other or in multiple cohort groups) that conform to the requirements of cohorting (see section 1d of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance), the daily log may be maintained for the cohort.
 - If a student(s) is not part of a stable cohort, then an individual student log must be maintained.
- Required components of individual daily student/cohort logs include:
 - Child's name
 - Drop off/pick up time
 - Parent/guardian name and emergency contact information
 - All staff (including itinerant staff, district staff, substitutes, and guest teachers) names and phone numbers who interact with a stable cohort or individual student
- Protocol to record/keep daily logs to be used for contact tracing for a minimum of four weeks to assist the LPHA as needed.
 - See supplemental guidance on LPHA/school partnering on contact tracing.
 - Refer to <u>OHA Policy on Sharing COVID-19 Information</u>
- Process to ensure that the school reports to and consults with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure if anyone who has entered school is diagnosed with COVID-19

1b. HIGH-RISK POPULATIONS

OHA/ODE Requirements

Serve students in high-risk population(s) whether learning is happening through On-Site (including outside), Hybrid (partially On-Site and partially Comprehensive Distance Learning models), or Comprehensive Distance Learning models.

Medically Fragile, Complex and Nursing-Dependent Student Requirements

- All districts must account for students who have health conditions that require additional nursing services. Oregon law (ORS 336.201) defines three levels of severity related to required nursing services:
 - Medically Complex: Are students who may have an unstable health condition and who may require daily professional nursing services.
 - Medically Fragile: Are students who may have a lifethreatening health condition and who may require immediate professional nursing services.
 - Nursing-Dependent: Are students who have an unstable or life-threatening health condition and who require daily, direct, and continuous professional nursing services.
- Review Supplemental Guidance on Community and Health Responsibilities Regarding FAPE in Relation to IDEA During CDL and Hybrid.
- Staff and school administrators, in partnership with school nurses, or other school health providers, should work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. The school registered nurse (RN) is responsible for nursing care provided to individual students as outlined in ODE guidance and state law:
 - Communicate with parents and health care providers to determine return to school status and current needs of the student.
 - Coordinate and update other health services the student may be receiving in addition to nursing services. This may include speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, as well as behavioral and mental health services.
 - Modify Health Management Plans, Care Plans, IEPs, or 504 or other student-level medical plans, as indicated, to address current health care considerations.
 - The RN practicing in the school setting should be supported to remain up to date on current guidelines and access professional support such as evidence-based resources from the <u>Oregon School Nurses Association</u>.
 - Service provision should consider health and safety as well as legal standards.
 - Appropriate medical-grade personal protective equipment (PPE) should be made available to <u>nurses and other health</u> <u>providers</u>.
 - Work with an interdisciplinary team to meet requirements of ADA and FAPE.
 - High-risk individuals may meet criteria for exclusion during a local health crisis.

Hood View Adventist School will provide equitable education to all enrolled students and will accommodate high-risk students to meet their needs through technology and/or personalized plans.

Hood View Adventist School works with Oregon Trail School District regarding students with needs, specifically Maria O'Meara, Special Education Coordinator for Oregon Trail School District and SPED coordinators at Naas Elementary in Boring.

1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require **use** of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings. If implementing Learning Outside guidance, establish an outside learning space for learning that maintains minimum 35 square feet per person.
 - Within this design, educators should have their own minimum of 35 square feet and the design of the learning environment must allow for some ability for the educator to move through the room efficiently and carefully without breaking 6 feet of physical distance to the maximum extent feasible.
- Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.
- Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building or outside learning space (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).
- Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. Provide instruction; don't employ punitive discipline.
- Staff must maintain physical distancing during all staff meetings and conferences, or consider remote web-based meetings.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Classroom Set Up:

- Teachers will remove excess furniture to provide needed square footage for learning areas.
- Class sizes will be limited, based on available square footage.
- Seating shall be assigned to maximize physical distancing and minimize physical interaction.
- Traffic flow A one-way flow of traffic will be established and marked in all common areas of the school with the expectation that students and staff will be trained to follow the traffic flow pattern. The traffic flow patterns will be designated with arrows which direction to walk, 6' spacing for appropriate distancing.
- Schedules -Students will each stay in their classroom with their cohort group for the majority of the day. If a cohort group needs to transition to another part of the building or outside, a 5-minute passing time will be scheduled for transitions of single cohort groups.
- Student instruction on distancing protocols- All staff will be trained on the appropriate health and safety ODE guidelines on physical distancing. Teachers will be required to teach, practice, review, and reteach the ODE guidelines in their classrooms on a regular basis. This will include appropriate protocols during arrival, dismissal, hallway transitions, common areas, and recess.
- PE & recess will be provided for each classroom. Playground protocol will be taught for following physical distancing. Activities and games will be promoted for which physical distancing can be maximized. PE & recess will be scheduled so that there is no overlap of cohort groups.

1d. COHORTING

OHA/ODE Requirements

Where feasible, establish stable cohorts: groups shall be no larger than can be accommodated by the space available to provide 35 square feet per person, including staff.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Hood View will have five student cohorts in gr. K-8. Preschool and PreK are each also their own stable group, under ECE guidelines.

- The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease. As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week⁴, unless the school is offering Learning Outside, then they must follow guidelines for cohorting in Learning Outside guidance. Schools must plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure. Cohorts may change week-to-week, but must be stable within the educational week.
- Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and sanitizing surfaces (e.g., desks, dry erase boards, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
- Design cohorts such that all students (including those protected under ADA and IDEA) maintain access to general education, gradelevel academic content standards⁵, and peers.
- Minimize the number of staff that interact with each cohort to the extent possible, staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.
- Elementary staff who interact with multiple cohorts (music, PE, library, paraprofessionals who provide supervision at recesses, etc.) should have schedules altered to reduce the number of cohorts/students they interact within a week. Consider having these staff engage via technology, altering duties so that they are not in close contact with students in multiple cohorts, or adjust schedules to reduce contacts.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Gr. K to 6th Cohorts: Students will be assigned to a classroom with no more than 22 students which meets the ODE 35 sq. feet distancing guidelines and will remain as a cohort throughout the day.

7-8 Cohort - Students will be assigned to a classroom with no more than 20 students which meets the ODE 35 sq. feet distancing guidelines. Teachers will move to the main 7-8 classroom to teach content subjects (Bible, Language Arts, Math, Science, electives) daily. Students will, for the most part, stay in their assigned classroom or designated learning area(s).

A daily log to ensure contract tracing which will be kept for a minimum of four weeks for each cohort.

Stable Cohorts - For students to minimize interaction between cohort groups the following safety guidelines will be put into practice:

- Students will use the bathroom associated with their cohort.
- All activities except for recess & P.E. will be held in the students' classroom area(s) or outdoors.
- Students will eat lunch in their classroom or respective cohort area.
- Separate outdoor school entrances will be used for each cohort group. Students will be dismissed one-by-one to maintain physical distancing while exiting.
- A master recess schedule will be created to avoid interaction between cohort groups. Several outdoor area zones will be designated for recesses and P.E. and assigned as indicated on the master schedule.
- Playground equipment (basketballs, bouncy balls, etc.) will generally be kept to one cohort group. Any shared equipment will be disinfected between cohort groups.
- Cleaning & Disinfecting Surfaces-The following CDC guidelines will consistently be following:
 - All door handles, desks, counters, & materials will be cleaned and sanitized between use by different cohorts AND between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
 - All door handles, desks, counters, supplies & materials will be routinely cleaned and sanitized at least twice daily within the same cohort.
- Students with Special Needs Following the ODE guidelines, students with special needs will maintain access to general education.

Sanitizing in Transitions- Staff who interact with different cohorts will wash their hands between interacting with each cohort. Each classroom and learning space will be provided with the appropriate sanitizing supplies.

1e. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMUNICATION AND TRAINING

OHA/ODE Requirements

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Communicate to staff at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals explaining infection control measures that are being implemented to prevent spread of disease. See Hood View Adventist School Communicable Disease Management Plan, attached.

⁴ The cohort limit is focused on the students experience and their limit of 100 people includes every person they come into contact with, including staff. There is not a limitation for staff in cohort size while care should be given to design and attention to the additional requirements.

⁵ Academic content standards refer to all of Oregon state academic standards and the Oregon CTE skill sets.

- ☐ Offer initial training to all staff prior to being in-person in any instructional model. Training could be accomplished through all staff webinar, narrated slide decks, online video, using professional learning communities, or mailing handouts with discussion. Training cannot be delivered solely through the sharing or forwarding information electronically or in paper copy form as this is an insufficient method for ensuring fidelity to public health protocols (see section 8b of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance for specific training requirements). Note: Instructional time requirements allow for time to be devoted for professional learning that includes RSSL training.
- Post "COVID -19 Hazard Poster" and "Masks Required" signs as required by OSHA administrative rule OAR 437-001-0744(3)(d) and (e).
- Develop protocols for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a person who has COVID-19.
 - The definition of exposure is being within 6 feet of a person who has COVID-19 for at least 15 cumulative minutes in a day.
 - OSHA has developed a model notification policy.
- Develop protocols for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the school community when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description of how the school or district is responding.
- Periodic interval training also keeps the vigilance to protocols ever present when fatigue and changing circumstances might result in reduced adherence to guidance.
- Provide all information in languages and formats accessible to the school community.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Communication for staff:

- Safe Schools training for COVID-19
- Pre-session training for Hood View Adventist School protocol
- Monthly Staff Meetings for updates on protocol

Communication for Parents:

- When the LPHA indicates that exposure has occurred, written (email and, in some cases, text alert) communication will be provided to families when COVID-19 cases are diagnosed in students or staff. Communication will be done with care to ensure privacy.
- Health communication will be provided in English and Spanish to accommodate the languages of the school community.

Infection control measures are shared with staff at twice monthly staff meetings and also via email.

Staff training has been provided for in-person instruction. This has occurred in staff meetings, through the SafeSchools online training portal, through slideshow presentations, and through handouts with discussion.

Appropriate signage is posted in the teacher workroom and throughout the building.

A written communication has been developed in the event of a positive COVID-19 case among the staff--the COVID-19 Notification Policy for employees—based on the OSHA model.

Notification of the families and school community follows the guidance provided in the *Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools* document.

Portions of the Operational Blueprint are reviewed at monthly staff meetings.

1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Direct students and staff to stay home if they have COVID-19 symptoms. COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:
 - Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (temperature of 100.4°F or higher) or chills, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, or new loss of taste or smell.
 - Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, new nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available <u>from</u> CDC.
 - In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students must be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. See pages 9-11 of OHA/ODE <u>Communicable Disease Guidance for Schools</u>.
 - Emergency signs that require immediate medical attention:
 - o Trouble breathing
 - o Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
 - New confusion or inability to awaken
 - Bluish lips or face (lighter skin); greyish lips or face (darker skin)

Entry Screening Procedures

- Parents will fill in a daily health screening form that each student will present prior to entry. On this form, parents will indicate absence/presence of any primary symptoms of concern. If symptoms of concern are present, the student will be excluded from school.
- Each student will wash his/her hands or use hand sanitizer upon entering the classroom. Staff will do so, also, upon entering the building and at periodic intervals.
- Teachers will also visually screen students upon entry.
- Students who exhibit symptoms will be sent to the office for further screening. The school isolation plan will be followed as needed.
- On the daily health screening form, parent(s) will also indicate any exposure to COVID-19, including exposure to

- Other severe symptoms
- ☑ Diligently screen all students and staff for symptoms on entry to bus/school/outside learning space every day. This can be done visually as well as asking students and staff about any new symptoms or close contact with someone with COVID-19. For students, confirmation from a parent/caregiver or guardian can also be appropriate. Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health, but regular reminders of the importance of daily screening must be provided to staff.
 - Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance) and sent home as soon as possible. <u>See table "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in</u> Schools."
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.
- ▼ Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19. See "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools" and the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled with medication must be excluded from school. Do not exclude staff or students who have other symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g., asthma, allergies, etc.) from school. See the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Hand hygiene on entry to school every day: wash with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- presumptive cases. If exposure has occurred, the student will be excluded from school.
- Plan for school implementation of isolation and send-home protocols:
 - Student will be isolated with an adult to monitor student's health.
 - o Parents will be notified to pick up student.
 - Student must remain home until eligible to return according to the *Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios* in Schools toolkit table.
 - When available, those presenting COVID-19 symptoms while at school will be tested for COVID-19 before leaving campus, as long as appropriate consent has been provided.
- Students will be excluded from school based on required OHA/ODE requirements and according to the *Planning for* COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools toolkit table and the HVAS Communicable Disease School Management Plan.
 - All staff and students exposed to COVID-19 will be restricted from school for up to 14 calendar days, per guidance from the LPHA, the *Planning for* COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools, and the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.

Teachers self-screen each day and attest to health and no-exposure by "signing in" on cohort log. Staff are reminded of self-screening procedures at monthly staff meetings.

1g. VISITORS/VOLUNTEERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- □ Restrict non-essential visitors/volunteers.
 - Examples of essential visitors include: DHS Child Protective Services, Law Enforcement, etc.
 - Examples of non-essential visitors/volunteers include: Parent Teacher Association (PTA), classroom volunteers, etc
- ☑ Diligently screen all visitors/volunteers for symptoms and ask questions about symptoms and any close contact with someone diagnosed with COVID-19 upon every entry. Restrict from school property any visitor known to have been exposed to COVID-19. See the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Visitors/volunteers must wash or sanitize their hands upon entry and exit.
- ∀ Visitors/volunteers must maintain six-foot distancing, wear face coverings, and adhere to all other provisions of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance.

Visitor Plan

- All visitors will be met in the enclosed lobby to determine if they are non-essential or essential.
- Non-essential visitors will be restricted from entering the common areas and classroom settings (all areas beyond the entry area).
- Essential visitors will be screened visually and will complete
 the health screening survey provided. They will wash their
 hands or utilize hand sanitizer before entering any common
 areas or classrooms. Visitors older than 5 years will wear
 face coverings and follow the 6-foot physical distancing
 guidelines and all HVAS health/safety guidelines (based on
 the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance. Visitors will
 sanitize or wash hands upon departure.
- Surfaces in the lobby, door handles, counters, etc. will be sanitized several times per day.

1h. FACE COVERINGS, FACE SHIELDS, AND CLEAR PLASTIC BARRIERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Employers are required to provide masks, face coverings, or face shields for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors and volunteers.
- Face coverings or face shields for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors or volunteers following <u>CDC guidelines</u> for <u>Face Coverings</u>. Individuals may remove their face coverings

All Hood View Adventist School staff, volunteers, visitors, or service providers will wear face coverings (or face shields, where applicable) when they are within 6 feet of students or others. They may remove face coverings when working alone in a private office or empty classroom.

while working alone in private offices or when separated by more than 6 feet in outside learning spaces. Face shields are an acceptable alternative only when a person has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering, when people need to see mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate, or when an individual is speaking to an audience for a short period of time and clear communication is otherwise not possible.

- Face coverings or face shields for all students in grades Kindergarten and up following <u>CDC guidelines for Face Coverings</u>. Face shields are an acceptable alternative when a student has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering, or when people need to see the student's mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate.
- Face coverings should be worn both indoors and outdoors, including during outdoor recess.
- Group mask breaks" or "full classroom mask breaks" are not allowed. If a student removes a face covering, or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short-period of time:
 - Provide space away from peers while the face covering is removed. In the classroom setting, an example could be a designated chair where a student can sit and take a 15 minute "sensory break;"
 - Students must not be left alone or unsupervised;
 - Designated area or chair must be appropriately distanced from other students and of a material that is easily wiped down for disinfection after each use:
 - Provide additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering;
 - Provide students adequate support to re-engage in safely wearing a face covering;
 - Students cannot be discriminated against or disciplined for an inability to safely wear a face covering during the school day.
- □ Face masks for school RNs or other medical personnel when providing direct contact care and monitoring of staff/students displaying symptoms. School nurses shall also wear appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for their role.
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.

Accommodations under ADA or IDEA and providing FAPE while attending to Face Covering Guidance

- ☑ If any student requires an accommodation to meet the requirement for face coverings, districts and schools must limit the student's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. Appropriate accommodations could include:
 - Offering different types of face coverings and face shields that may meet the needs of the student.
 - Spaces away from peers while the face covering is removed; students must not be left alone or unsupervised.
 - Short periods of the educational day that do not include wearing the face covering, while following the other health strategies to reduce the spread of disease.
 - Additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering.
- For students with existing medical conditions and a physician's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts must not deny any in-person instruction.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Disposable and re-usable masks are available at the school office.

All students in grades Kindergarten and up will be required to wear face coverings or face shields according to CDC guidance, unless they are protected under the ADA or IDEA or present a doctor's note. In this case, efforts will be made to maximize proximity to others.

Face covering breaks will be implemented during eating, drinking, or outdoors while maintaining 6-ft distancing.

If a student removes a face covering or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short period of time, the teacher will implement grace for the current need and will establish a designated area for this need. The teacher will reinforce face covering protocol at the appropriate time.

If ADA accommodations are needed for a staff member which exclude him/her from wearing a mask, limited exposure to the students will be implemented as much as possible.

Medical-grade face masks, shields, and PPE are available to be worn by any personnel who provides care and monitoring of staff/students displaying symptoms.

If the team determines that the disability is prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement, follow the requirements for students eligible for, or receiving services under, a 504/IEP who cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, If a student's 504/IEP plan included supports/goals/instruction for behavior or social emotional learning, the school team must evaluate the student's plan prior to providing instruction through Comprehensive Distance Learning. - Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas where staff/students will be isolated. If two students present COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they must be isolated at once. If separate rooms are not available, ensure that six feet distance is maintained. Do not assume they have the same illness. Consider if and where students and staff will be isolated during learning outside. Create a comfortable outdoor area for isolation or follow plan for in building isolation.
- Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.
- Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
- Additional guidance for nurses and health staff for providing care to students with complex needs.
- Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation area in the school or outside learning space, with adequate space and staff supervision and symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
 - School nurses and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than 6 feet) must wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual must be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
 - After removing PPE, hands shall be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual shall wear a face covering.
 - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and
 must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they
 have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in "Planning for COVID19 Scenarios in Schools."
- Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).
- Record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.
- The school must provide a remote learning option for students who are required to be temporarily off-site for isolation and quarantine.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- All students who become ill at school with excludable symptoms of COVID-19 will remain at school within the school designated isolation area supervised by staff until parents can pick them up. Student will be provided a facial covering and maintain physical distancing. Supervising staff will use medical-grade masks while supervising ill students.
- If more than one student becomes ill at school with symptoms of COVID-19, each will be provided with their isolation area, or 6-ft distancing will be maintained in any shared isolation area.
- While exercising caution to maintain (ensure) safety is appropriate when working with children exhibiting symptoms, staff shall maintain sufficient composure and disposition so as not to unduly worry a student or family.
- Staff will maintain student confidentiality as appropriate.
- Daily logs will be maintained containing the following:
 - Name of students sent home for illness, cause of illness, time of onset, as per designated communicable disease surveillance logs; and
 - Name of students visiting the office for illness symptoms, even if not sent home, as per routine health logs
- Staff and students with known or suspected COVID-19
 cannot remain at school and shall return only after their
 symptoms resolve and they are physically ready to return to
 school. In no case can they return before until they meet the
 necessary health requirements based on the Planning for
 COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools toolkit table.
- Records will be kept to indicate those with COVID-19-related illness for LPHA review.



2. Facilities and School Operations

Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, locker rooms). 2e. ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

2f. CLASSROOMS/REPURPOSED LEARNING SPACES

 Materials: Each classroom will limit sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). Any shared items will be sanitized between student uses. Hand sanitizer and tissues will be available for use by students and staff. In general, students will each have their own assigned supplies that will be stored separately from others' supplies.

Handwashing:

- Age-appropriate signage will be provided for regular reminders for hand washing. Students will be trained all on the protocols for washing hands and regarding respiratory etiquette.
- All students and staff will wash hands prior to meals and snacks, after using the restroom, and as needed throughout the day. Appropriate sanitizer may be used at times other than before meals and after toileting.
- Hand washing protocol will include soap and water washing for 20 seconds or alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.
- Staff will wash hands or sanitize hands during all transitions between classrooms, groups, breaks, etc.
- Hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol will be used when hand washing with soap is not available.
- Classroom Procedure: All classes will assign each student a cubby, desk or storage space for each individual student's belongings.
- Seating: Hallway will have visual aids to illustrate traffic flow and classrooms will have indicators of appropriate spacing, assigned seating areas, etc.

Environment: When possible, windows will be open in the classroom before students arrive and after students leave, and at times during the day. Each classroom will hold classes outside when possible and encourage students to maintain 6' distancing.

2g. PLAYGROUNDS, FIELDS, RECESS, BREAKS, AND RESTROOMS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Keep school playgrounds closed to the general public until park playground equipment and benches reopen in the community (see Oregon Health Authority's <u>Specific Guidance for Outdoor</u> <u>Recreation Organizations</u>).
- After using the restroom students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds. Soap must be made available to students and staff. For learning outside if portable bathrooms are used, set up portable hand washing stations and create a regular cleaning schedule.
- ⊠ Before and after using playground equipment, students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.
- Designate playground and shared equipment solely for the use of one cohort at a time. Outdoor playground structures require normal routine cleaning and do not require disinfection. Shared

- Outdoor learning spaces must have at least 75% of the square footage of its sides open for airflow.
- Outdoor playground structures require normal routine cleaning and do not require disinfection. Shared equipment should be cleaned and disinfected at least daily in accordance with <u>CDC</u> guidance.
- Apply disinfectants safely and correctly following labeling direction as specified by the manufacturer. Keep these products away from students.
- To reduce the risk of asthma, choose disinfectant products on the EPA List N with asthma-safer ingredients (e.g. hydrogen peroxide, citric acid, or lactic acid) and avoid products that mix these with asthma-causing ingredients like peroxyacetic acid, sodium hypochlorite (bleach), or quaternary ammonium compounds.
- Schools with HVAC systems must evaluate the system to minimize indoor air recirculation (thus maximizing fresh outdoor air) to the extent possible. Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems shall, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and interior doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present. Do not prop open doors that can pose a safety or security risk to students and staff (e.g., exterior doors and fire doors that must remain closed.)
- Schools with HVAC systems should ensure all filters are maintained and replaced as necessary to ensure proper functioning of the system.
- All intake ports that provide outside air to the HVAC system should be cleaned, maintained, and cleared of any debris that may affect the function and performance of the ventilation system.
- Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do <u>not</u> use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Consider using window fans or box fans positioned in open windows to blow fresh outdoor air into the classroom via one window, and indoor air out of the classroom via another window. Fans must not be used in rooms with closed windows and doors, as this does not allow for fresh air to circulate.
- Consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special health care needs receive medication or treatments.
- Facilities must be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see <u>CDC's guidance on</u> <u>disinfecting public spaces</u>).
- Consider modification or enhancement of building ventilation where feasible (see <u>CDC's guidance on ventilation and filtration</u> and <u>American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-</u> Conditioning Engineers' guidance).

2m. SCHOOL EMERGENCY PROCEDURES AND DRILLS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ In accordance with ORS 336.071 and OAR 581-022-2225 all schools (including those operating a Comprehensive Distance Learning model) are required to instruct students on emergency procedures. Schools that operate an On-Site or Hybrid model need to instruct and practice drills on emergency procedures so that students and staff can respond to emergencies.
 - At least 30 minutes in each school month must be used to instruct students on the emergency procedures for fires, earthquakes (including tsunami drills in appropriate zones), and safety threats.
 - Fire drills must be conducted monthly.
 - Earthquake drills (including tsunami drills and instruction for schools in a tsunami hazard zone) must be conducted two times a year.
 - Safety threats including procedures related to lockdown, lockout, shelter in place and evacuation and other appropriate actions to take when there is a threat to safety must be conducted two times a year.
- Drills can and should be carried out <u>as close as possible</u> to the procedures that would be used in an actual emergency. For example, a fire drill must be carried out with the same alerts and same routes as normal. If appropriate and practicable, COVID-19 physical distancing measures can be implemented, but only if they do not compromise the drill.
- When or if physical distancing must be compromised, drills must be completed in less than 15 minutes.
- ☑ Drills shall not be practiced unless they can be practiced correctly.
- Train staff on safety drills prior to students arriving on the first day on campus in hybrid or face-to-face engagement.
