

OPERATIONAL BLUEPRINT FOR SCHOOL REENTRY 2020-21

Updated 10/30/2020

Under ODE's *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance, each school¹ has been directed to submit a plan to the district² in order to provide on-site and/or hybrid instruction. Districts must submit each school's plan to the local school board and make the plans available to the public. This form is to be used to document a district's, school's or program's plan to ensure students can return for the 2020-21 school year, in some form, in accordance with Executive Order 20-25(10). Schools must use the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance document as they complete their Operational Blueprint for Reentry. ODE recommends plan development be inclusive of, but not limited to, school-based administrators, teachers and school staff, health and nursing staff, association leadership, nutrition services, transportation services, tribal consultation,³ parents and others for purposes of providing expertise, developing broad understanding of the health protocols and carrying out plan implementation.

 - If a student(s) is part of a stable cohort (a group of students that are consistently in contact with each other or in multiple cohort groups) that conform to the requirements of cohorting (see section 1d of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance), the daily log may be maintained for the cohort.
 - If a student(s) is not part of a stable cohort, then an individual student log must be maintained.
- Required components of individual daily student/cohort logs include:
 - Child's name
 - Drop off/pick up time
 - Parent/guardian name and emergency contact information
 - All staff (including itinerant staff, district staff, substitutes, and guest teachers) names and phone numbers who interact with a stable cohort or individual student
- Protocol to record/keep daily logs to be used for contact tracing for a minimum of four weeks to assist the LPHA as needed.
- Process to ensure that all itinerant and all district staff (maintenance, administrative, delivery, nutrition, and any other staff) who move between buildings keep a log or calendar with a running four-week history of their time in each school building and who they were in contact with at each site.
- Process to ensure that the school reports to and consults with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure if anyone who has entered school is diagnosed with COVID-19.
- Designate a staff member and process to ensure that the school provides updated information regarding current instructional

1b. HIGH-RISK POPULATIONS

OHA/ODE Requirements

Serve students in high-risk population(s) whether learning is happening through On-Site, Hybrid (partially On-Site and partially Comprehensive Distance Learning models), or Comprehensive Distance Learning models.

Medically Fragile, Complex and Nursing-Dependent Student Requirements

- All districts must account for students who have health conditions that require additional nursing services. Oregon law (ORS 336.201) defines three levels of severity related to required nursing services:
 - Medically Complex: Are students who may have an unstable health condition and who may require daily professional nursing services.
 - Medically Fragile: Are students who may have a lifethreatening health condition and who may require immediate professional nursing services.
 - Nursing-Dependent: Are students who have an unstable or life-threatening health condition and who require daily, direct, and continuous professional nursing services.
- Staff and school administrators, in partnership with school nurses, or other school health providers, should work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. The school registered nurse (RN) is responsible for nursing care provided to individual students as outlined in ODE guidance and state law:
 - Communicate with parents and health care providers to determine return to school status and current needs of the student.
 - Coordinate and update other health services the student may be receiving in addition to nursing services. This may include speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, as well as behavioral and mental health services.
 - Modify Health Management Plans, Care Plans, IEPs, or 504 or other student-level medical plans, as indicated, to address current health care considerations.
 - The RN practicing in the school setting should be supported to remain up to date on current guidelines and access professional support such as evidence-based resources from the Oregon School Nurses Association.
 - Service provision should consider health and safety as well as legal standards.
 - Appropriate medical-grade personal protective equipment (PPE) should be made available to <u>nurses and other health</u> providers.
 - Work with an interdisciplinary team to meet requirements of ADA and FAPE.
 - High-risk individuals may meet criteria for exclusion during a local health crisis.
 - Refer to updated state and national guidance and resources such as:
 - U.S. Department of Education Supplemental Fact Sheet: Addressing the Risk of COVID-19 in Preschool, Elementary and Secondary Schools While Serving Children with Disabilities from March 21, 2020.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Hood View Adventist School will provide equitable education to all enrolled students whether on-site, hybrid, or comprehensive distance learning, and will accommodate high-risk students to meet their needs through technology and/or personalized plans.

Hood View Adventist School works with Oregon Trail School District regarding students with needs, specifically SPED coordinators at Naas Elementary in Boring.

1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.
- Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.
- Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).
- Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. Provide instruction; don't employ punitive discipline.
- Staff must maintain physical distancing during all staff meetings and conferences, or consider remote web-based meetings.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Classroom Set Up:

- Teachers will remove excess furniture to provide needed square footage for learning areas
- Fabric-covered furniture will be minimized.
- Seating shall be assigned to maximize physical distancing and minimize physical interaction.
- Traffic flow A one-way flow of traffic will be established and marked in all common areas of the school with the expectation that students and staff will be trained to follow the traffic flow pattern. The traffic flow patterns will be designated with arrows which direction to walk, 6' spacing for appropriate distancing.
- Schedules -Students will each stay in their classroom with their cohort group for the majority of the day. If a cohort group needs to transition to another part of the building or outside, a 5-minute passing time will be scheduled for transitions of single cohort groups.
- Student instruction on distancing protocols- All staff will be trained on the appropriate health and safety ODE guidelines on physical distancing. Teachers will be required to teach, practice, review, and reteach the ODE guidelines in their classrooms on a regular basis. This will include appropriate protocols during arrival, dismissal, hallway transitions, common areas, and recess.
- PE & recess will be provided daily for each classroom.
 Playground protocol will be taught for following physical distancing. Activities and games will be promoted for which physical distancing can be maximized. PE & recess will be scheduled so that there is no overlap of cohort groups.

Music class will be planned with non-wind instruments that are not shared within cohorts. Instruments will be sanitized between cohorts. If singing takes place, students will maintain 12' distancing.

1d. COHORTING

OHA/ODE Requirements

Where feasible, establish stable cohorts: groups shall be no larger than can be accommodated by the space available to provide 35 square feet per person, including staff.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Hood View will have eight student cohorts: Preschool, PreK, K, 1, 2, 3, 4-5, 6, 7-8

- The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease. As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week. Schools must plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure. Cohorts may change week-to-week, but must be stable within the educational week.
- Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces (e.g., desks, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort
- Design cohorts such that all students (including those protected under ADA and IDEA) maintain access to general education, gradelevel academic content standards, and peers.
- Staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Preschool to 6th Cohorts: Students will be assigned to a classroom with no more than 24 students which meets the ODE 35 sq. feet distancing guidelines and will remain as a cohort throughout the day.

7-8 Cohort - Students will be assigned to a classroom with no more than 28 students which meets the ODE 35 sq. feet distancing guidelines. Teachers will move to the main 7-8 classroom to teach content subjects (Bible, Language Arts, Math, Science, electives) daily. Students will, for the most part, stay in their assigned classroom.

A daily log to ensure contract tracing which will be kept for a minimum of four weeks for each cohort.

Stable Cohorts - For students to minimize interaction between cohort groups the following safety guidelines will be put into practice:

- Students will use the bathroom associated with their cohort.
- All activities except for recess & P.E. will be held in the students' classroom area or outdoors.
- Students will eat lunch in their classroom or respective cohort area.
- Separate outdoor school entrances will be used for each cohort group. Students will be dismissed one-by-one to maintain physical distancing while exiting.
- A master recess schedule will be created to avoid interaction between cohort groups. Several outdoor area zones will be designated for recesses and P.E. and assigned as indicated on the master schedule.
- Playground equipment (basketballs, bouncy balls, etc.) will generally be kept to one cohort group. Any shared equipment will be disinfected between cohort groups.
- Whenever possible, high-touch surfaces of the play structure shall be disinfected between each cohort group.
- Cleaning & Disinfecting Surfaces-The following CDC guidelines will consistently be following:
 - All door handles, desks, counters, & materials will be cleaned and sanitized between use by different cohorts AND between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
 - All door handles, desks, counters, supplies & materials will be routinely cleaned and sanitized at least twice daily within the same cohort.
- Students with Special Needs Following the ODE guidelines, students with special needs will maintain access to general education.

Sanitizing in Transitions- Staff who interact with different cohorts must wash their hands between interacting with each cohort. Each classroom and learning space will be provided with the appropriate sanitizing supplies.

1e. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMUNICATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Communicate to staff at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals explaining infection control measures that are being implemented to prevent spread of disease.
- Develop protocols for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a person who has COVID-19.
 - The definition of exposure is being within 6 feet of a person who has COVID-19 for at least 15 cumulative minutes in a day.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Communication for staff:

- Safe Schools training for COVID-19
- Pre-session training for Hood View Adventist School protocol
- Monthly Staff Meetings for updates on protocol

- Develop protocols for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the school community when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description of how the school or district is responding.
- Provide all information in languages and formats accessible to the school community.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Communication for Parents:

- Written (email & text alert) communication will be provided to families when COVID-19 cases are diagnosed in students or staff
- Health communication will be provided in English and Spanish to accommodate the languages of the school community.

1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Direct students and staff to stay home if they, or anyone in their homes or community living spaces, have COVID-19 symptoms, or if anyone in their home or community living spaces has COVID-19. COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:
 - Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (temperature of 100.4°F or higher) or chills, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, or new loss of taste or smell.
 - Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, new nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available from CDC.
 - In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students must be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. See pages 9-11 of OHA/ODE Communicable Disease Guidance for Schools.
 - Emergency signs that require immediate medical attention:
 - Trouble breathing
 - o Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
 - New confusion or inability to awaken
 - Bluish lips or face (lighter skin); greyish lips or face (darker skin)
 - Other severe symptoms
- Screen all students and staff for symptoms on entry to bus/school every day. This can be done visually and/or with confirmation from a parent/caregiver/guardian. Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health.
 - Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance) and sent home as soon as possible.
 See table "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.
- Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19. See table "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."
- ☑ Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has
 worsened or is not well-controlled with medication must be
 excluded from school. Do not exclude staff or students who have
 other symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g.,
 asthma, allergies, etc.) from school.
- Hand hygiene on entry to school every day: wash with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Entry Screening Procedures

- Parents will fill in a daily health screening form that each student will present prior to entry. On this form, parents will indicate absence/presence of any primary symptoms of concern. If symptoms of concern are present, the student will be excluded from school.
- Each student will wash his/her hands or use hand sanitizer upon entering the classroom.
- Teachers will also visually screen students upon entry.
- Students who exhibit symptoms will be sent to the office for further screening. The school isolation plan will be followed as needed.
- Plan for school implementation of isolation and send-home protocols
 - Student will be isolated with an adult to monitor student's health.
 - o Parents will be notified to pick up student.
 - Student must remain home until eligible to return according to the *Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios* in Schools toolkit table.
- Students will be excluded from school based on required OHA/ODE requirements and according to the Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools toolkit table and the HVAS Communicable Disease School Management Plan.
 - All staff and students exposed to COVID-19 will be restricted from school for 14 calendar days.

1g. VISITORS/VOLUNTEERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- □ Restrict non-essential visitors/volunteers.
 - Examples of essential visitors include: DHS Child Protective Services, Law Enforcement, etc.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Visitor Plan

• All visitors will be met in the enclosed lobby to determine if they are non-essential or essential.

- Examples of non-essential visitors/volunteers include: Parent Teacher Association (PTA), classroom volunteers, etc.
- Screen all visitors/volunteers for symptoms upon every entry. Restrict from school property any visitor known to have been exposed to COVID-19. <u>See table "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios</u> in Schools."
- Visitors/volunteers must wash or sanitize their hands upon entry and exit.
- Visitors/volunteers must maintain six-foot distancing, wear face coverings, and adhere to all other provisions of this guidance.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- Non-essential visitors will be restricted from entering the common areas and classroom settings (all areas beyond the entry area).
- Essential visitors will be screened visually and will complete
 the health screening survey provided. They will wash their
 hands or utilize hand sanitizer before entering any common
 areas or classrooms. Visitors older than 5 years will wear
 face coverings and follow the 6-foot social distancing and all
 HVAS health/safety guidelines.
- Surfaces in the lobby, door handles, counters, etc. will be sanitized several times per day.

1h. FACE COVERINGS, FACE SHIELDS, AND CLEAR PLASTIC BARRIERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Face coverings or face shields for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors or volunteers following CDC guidelines for Face Coverings. Individuals may remove their face coverings while working alone in private offices. Face shields are an acceptable alternative when a person has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering, when people need to see mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate, or when an individual is speaking to an audience for a short period of time and clear communication is otherwise not possible.
- Face coverings or face shields for all students in grades Kindergarten and up following CDC guidelines for Face Coverings. Face shields are an acceptable alternative when a student has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering, or when people need to see the student's mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate.
- Face coverings should be worn both indoors and outdoors, including during outdoor recess.
- Group mask breaks" or "full classroom mask breaks" are not allowed. If a student removes a face covering, or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short-period of time:
 - Provide space away from peers while the face covering is removed. In the classroom setting, an example could be a designated chair where a student can sit and take a 15 minute "sensory break;"
 - Students must not be left alone or unsupervised;
 - Designated area or chair must be appropriately distanced from other students and of a material that is easily wiped down for disinfection after each use;
 - Provide additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering;
 - Provide students adequate support to re-engage in safely wearing a face covering;
 - Students cannot be discriminated against or disciplined for an inability to safely wear a face covering during the school day.
- Face masks for school RNs or other medical personnel when providing direct contact care and monitoring of staff/students displaying symptoms. School nurses shall also wear appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for their role.
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.

Protections under the ADA or IDEA:

☑ If any student requires an accommodation to meet the requirement for face coverings, districts and schools must limit the student's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. Appropriate accommodations could include:


All Hood View Adventist School staff, volunteers, visitors, or service providers will wear face coverings (or face shields, where applicable) when they are within 6 feet of students or others. They may remove face coverings when working alone in a private office.

All students in grades Kindergarten and up will be required to wear face coverings or face shields according to CDC guidance, unless they are protected under the ADA or IDEA or present a doctor's note.

Face covering breaks will be implemented during eating, drinking, or outdoors while maintaining 6-ft distancing.

If a student removes a face covering or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short period of time, the teacher will implement grace for the current need and will establish a designated area for this need. The teacher will reinforce face covering protocol at the appropriate time.

If ADA accommodations are needed for a staff member which exclude him/her from wearing a mask, limited exposure to the students will be implemented as much as possible.

1i. ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day.
- Protocols for screening students, as well as exclusion and isolation protocols for sick students and staff identified at the time of arrival or during the school day.
 - Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff
 with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas
 where staff/students will be isolated. If two students present
 COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they must be isolated
 at once. If separate rooms are not available, ensure that six
 feet distance is maintained. Do not assume they have the
 same illness.
 - Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.
 - Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff for providing care to students with complex needs.
- Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation area in the school, with adequate space and staff supervision and symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
 - School nurse and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than 6 feet) must wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual must be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
 - After removing PPE, hands shall be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual shall wear a face covering.
 - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in <u>"Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."</u>
- Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).
- Record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.

- All students who become ill at school with excludable symptoms of COVID-19 will remain at school within the school designated isolation area supervised by staff until parents can pick them up. Student will be provided a facial covering and maintain physical distancing. Supervising staff will use medical-grade masks while supervising ill students.
- If more than one student becomes ill at school with symptoms of COVID-19, each will be provided with their isolation area, or 6-ft distancing will be maintained in any shared isolation area.
- While exercising caution to maintain (ensure) safety is appropriate when working with children exhibiting symptoms, staff shall maintain sufficient composure and disposition so as not to unduly worry a student or family.
- Staff will maintain student confidentiality as appropriate.
- Daily logs will be maintained containing the following:
 - Name of students sent home for illness, cause of illness, time of onset, as per designated communicable disease surveillance logs; and
 - Name of students visiting the office for illness symptoms, even if not sent home, as per routine health logs
- Staff and students with known or suspected COVID-19
 cannot remain at school and shall return only after their
 symptoms resolve and they are physically ready to return to
 school. In no case can they return before until they meet the
 necessary health requirements based on the Planning for
 COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools toolkit table.

Records will be kept to indicate those with illness.



2. Facilities and School Operations

Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, locker rooms). Screening Students

Arrival/Dismissal

- During afternoon dismissals, parents will wait for students at curbside.
- Supervision will be provided to ensure physical distancing during arrival and departure.
- Students will be asked to wear face coverings from the time they leave or until they enter their vehicles.
- Teachers and staff will establish procedures to provide for continued physical distancing upon entering the classroom.

2f. CLASSROOMS/REPURPOSED LEARNING SPACES

- Seating: Rearrange student desks and other seat spaces so that staff and students' physical bodies are six feet apart to the maximum extent possible while also maintaining 35 square feet per person; assign seating so students are in the same seat at all times.
- Materials: Avoid sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). Clean these items frequently. Provide hand sanitizer and tissues for use by students and staff.
- Handwashing: Remind students (with signage and regular verbal reminders from staff) of the utmost importance of hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette. Respiratory etiquette means covering coughs and sneezes with an elbow or a tissue. Tissues shall be disposed of in a garbage can, then hands washed or sanitized immediately.

2j. CLEANING, DISINFECTION, AND VENTILATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Clean, sanitize, and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (e.g. door handles, sink handles, drinking fountains, transport vehicles) and shared objects (e.g., toys, games, art supplies) between uses multiple times per day. Maintain clean and disinfected (CDC guidance) environments, including classrooms, cafeteria settings and restrooms.
- Outdoor playground structures require normal routine cleaning and do not require disinfection. Shared equipment should be cleaned and disinfected at least daily in accordance with <u>CDC</u> guidance.
 - Apply disinfectants safely and correctly following labeling direction as specified by the manufacturer. Keep these products away from students.
- ☑ To reduce the risk of asthma, choose disinfectant products on the EPA List N with asthma-safer ingredients (e.g. hydrogen peroxide, citric acid, or lactic acid) and avoid products that mix these with asthma-causing ingredients like peroxyacetic acid, sodium hypochlorite (bleach), or quaternary ammonium compounds.
- Schools with HVAC systems must evaluate the system to minimize indoor air recirculation (thus maximizing fresh outdoor air) to the extent possible. Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems shall, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and interior doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present. Do not prop open doors that can pose a safety or security risk to students and staff (e.g., exterior doors and fire doors that must remain closed).
- Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do <u>not</u> use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Consider using window fans or box fans positioned in open windows to blow fresh outdoor air into the classroom via one window, and indoor air out of the classroom via another window. Fans must not be used in rooms with closed windows and doors, as this does not allow for fresh air to circulate.
- Consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special health care needs receive medication or treatments.
- Facilities must be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see <u>CDC's guidance on</u> disinfecting public spaces).

2m. SCHOOL EMERGENCY PROCEDURES AND DRILLS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ In accordance with ORS 336.071 and OAR 581-022-2225 all schools (including those operating a Comprehensive Distance Learning model) are required to instruct students on emergency procedures. Schools that operate an On-Site or Hybrid model need to instruct and practice drills on emergency procedures so that students and staff can respond to emergencies.
 - At least 30 minutes in each school month must be used to instruct students on the emergency procedures for fires, earthquakes (including tsunami drills in appropriate zones), and safety threats.
 - Fire drills must be conducted monthly.
 - Earthquake drills (including tsunami drills and instruction for schools in a tsunami hazard zone) must be conducted two times a year.
 - Safety threats including procedures related to lockdown, lockout, shelter in place and evacuation and other appropriate actions to take when there is a threat to safety must be conducted two times a year.
- ☑ Drills can and should be carried out <u>as close as possible</u> to the procedures that would be used in an actual emergency. For example, a fire drill must be carried out with the same alerts and same routes as normal. If appropriate and practicable, COVID-19 physical distancing measures can be implemented, but only if they do not compromise the drill.
- When or if physical distancing must be compromised, drills must be completed in less than 15 minutes.

- Train staff on safety drills prior to students arriving on the first day on campus in hybrid or face-to-face engagement.

- Students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol after a drill is complete.

Monthly fire drills shall continue, with added social distancing, as appropriate/possible. Fire drills shall not exceed 15 minutes.

Semesterly earthquake drills will be conducted, as usual, but with 6-ft. distancing.

Semesterly safety drills (lockdown, lockout, shelter in place, etc.) shall be conducted, with modifications. These shall not exceed 15 minutes in duration.

All students shall wash their hands or use an approved hand sanitizer after drills.

 - Student engages in behavior that requires them to be isolated from peers and results in a room clear.
 - o If students leave the classroom:
 - Preplan for a clean and safe alternative space that maintains physical safety for the student and staff
 - Ensure physical distancing and separation occur, to the maximum extent possible.
 - Use the least restrictive interventions possible to maintain physical safety for the student and staff.
 - Wash hands after a close interaction.
 - Note the interaction on the appropriate contact log.
 - *If unexpected interaction with other stable cohorts occurs, those contacts must be noted in the appropriate contact logs.
 - Student engages in physically aggressive behaviors that preclude the possibility of maintaining physical distance and/or require physical de-escalation or intervention techniques other than restraint or seclusion (e.g., hitting, biting, spitting, kicking, self-injurious behavior).
 - o If staff need to intervene for student safety, staff should:
 - Maintain student dignity throughout and following the incident.
 - Use empathetic and calming verbal interactions (i.e. "This seems hard right now. Help me understand... How can I help?") to attempt to re-regulate the student without physical intervention.

Training will be provided for teachers for de-escalation, lagging skill instruction, and alternatives to restraint and seclusion, as needed.
